# Cheers to a fabulous season



The Day Ladies Flight League had a total of 59 registered curlers on 15 teams, a well-subscribed league. Curling commenced in October with a full round robin involving all teams until mid-January. The league was then split into A and B divisions with two round robins. The A division winner was the team of Lisa Freeman (skip), Judy Sly (vice), Debbie Hynes (second) and Anna Voskamp (lead) and the B division winner was Mary Paterson (skip), Brenda Charette, Martha Tanner and Debbie Mansell. An unfortunate consequence of having 15 teams and six sheets of ice was that we were short of ice time! We had to go looking for open ice where there would be as few conflicts as possible. We settled on Monday and the Senior Men's Flight gave us one sheet a week. Monday worked, but had some drawbacks – reporting scoring was difficult and some curlers also curled EL Flight on Monday evenings resulting in two games in one day. This lack of ice spurred us on to look for a better solution for the 2023-24 season. After much debate we chose to ask the DL members to vote on switching Tuesday DL Club ice for the Flight ice. Tuesday Club had three sheets on Tuesday morning which were rarely used and six sheets on Tuesday afternoon. Ninety-two of the 107 DL members voted, with 61 agreeing to the change and 31 voting against.

As the saying goes, "Life is all about changes", so your executive is optimistic that the change of day will encourage more ladies to try Flight and enjoy the fun of curling with the same team all year.

# Game Umpire has best seat in the house

Tom Sephton has a front row seat to many of Canada's most high-profile curling competitions. He is frequently seen on TSN and is on a first-name basis with curling's most elite competitors. When he speaks, they listen. If there is a problem on-ice, they call him.

Tom is an official or Game Umpire with Curling Canada. His most recent gigs include the Men's Worlds in Ottawa and the Brier in London.

Like most other officials, he does it for the love of the game. It certainly isn't for the money, because game umpires, like timers and other officials, are not paid. Only their expenses (air fare, hotels, meals) are covered.

"It has been a lot of fun," he says of his 15 years as an official. "I have met a lot of different people from all walks of life.

"I enjoy meeting the curlers and the other umpires from across Canada. You meet the volunteers, timers, ice technicians, and club organizers. Everyone who volunteers is fantastic. It's a really fun time."

There are five levels of officiating with Curling Canada (CC) beginning with Time Clock Operator/Observer (previously Level 1), CC Member Association Game Umpire (previously Level 2), CC Member Association Chief Umpire (Level 3), National Game Umpire, Deputy Chief Umpire and Chief Umpire (Level 4) and National Chief Umpire (Level 5). It's a fairly lengthy progression, with mentorship and evaluation and practice at every level.

Tom is a Level 3 umpire, having been a Chief Umpire for the Nova Scotia Curling Association for the four years prior to the start of the pandemic in 2020 and a Deputy Chief Umpire for three or four years before that.

After the pandemic "hit", he moved from Nova Scotia to Kingston to be closer to his grandchildren. Tom started curling when he was 12 years old. In 1972 he skipped the winning team in the Quebec Junior Boys provincial championship. In 2011 he played lead on the Steve Ogden team from the Mayflower Curling Club in the Nova Scotia Men's Molson Provincial Championship, losing the final game to Shawn Adams and his chance to compete at the 2011 Brier in London.

So he was a already competitive curler in Nova Scotia when he was recruited by a Chief Umpire there who felt that having a competitive curler on the officiating crew would be beneficial, "someone who knew what it's like as a player to be out there under stressful psychological and emotional conditions."

Tom did his Level 1 certification as a statistician. "You have to know if a shot is made or not, and it helps if you're a curler." He has also done the stats at a couple of Briers.

"It gives you a different perspective," Tom says. Although he appreciates officiating at national, elite-level games where curlers know the game inside out, Tom has also enjoyed working with youth curlers, especially during the years he spent in Nova Scotia, officiating at games from U14 to U21 and watching these young athletes get better and better at the game.

When he met Matt Manuel, skip of Team Nova Scotia at the 2023 Brier in London, it was "like old home week". Tom first met Matt when the young skip was competing to represent Nova Scotia at the Canada Winter Games, but he had seen him competing through U18, U21 and at the university level.

As a Game Umpire, however, Tom is scrupulously neutral. The advent of betting has made it even more important and training now includes watching for signs of game manipulation.

"You cannot get emotionally involved because of betting. It's important that you count everything. Before the stones are kicked away at the end of the game, you still have to know exactly how many rocks were counting because of margins and spreads in betting."

If you look closely at a televised game, you'll notice that the Game Umpire has a clipboard stowed discreetly beside his chair which he uses to jot down notes.

"I keep track of scores, hog line violations, whether a stationary stone was touched and replaced, if a stone is touching the centre line, whether it went out of play, whether the clock is running when it shouldn't be. As a game umpire, you're always taking notes, kind of creating a diary. And you're watching the clock. Sometimes the timer is slow at the beginning of the game. If you're Kevin Koe, you need that time."

If a team complains that another is releasing the rock after the hogline, a "rover" or official from a few sheets over may observe without being too obvious about it. Complaints about lingering hands and knees on the ice are rare, as players know all too well how this affects the ice.

Brooms smashed in a fit of anger and carelessly dropped F-bombs are another issue, and are dealt with off-ice, away from the television cameras. Now that the Scotties and Brier have cash-sharing, Tom explains, every team receives a cheque minus penalties for swearing.

When measuring rocks with the micrometer, officials follow a standard procedure such as always putting the feet of the device on the ice first to stabilize it and cleaning the point of the of the measure before setting it carefully in the pinhole. The rocks are always measured clockwise and umpires are allowed to measure three times. If it still seems like a tie, then the Chief Umpire is called in.

A laser measure is used to measure closest to the pin for Last Stone Draw, but the micrometer is still the most accurate measurement otherwise. With so much on the line, you'd think a game umpire would be nervous before games. But with

years of training under their belts and having talked to the players and coaches before games and practices, they're prepared.

"I don't get nervous, I get 'up' for the game," says Tom. "We do the pre-game practice and last stone draws, do measurements for hammer. It's important because it is used to split ties. By the time the game gets started, you're into it.

"As a game umpire, you're immersed in the game, you know which exactly stone is being thrown. You may not know the call, because the television camera might be in the way. But there is so much that you can anticipate. For example, when a team is going to call a time-out, you can tell by their body language. The timer is also watching, so by the time I call it up, they already know."

Since curlers are not allowed on the ice without an official present, game umpires may be at the arena from 6:30 in the morning until 11 at night. "When there are four draws a day, it's tough," admits Tom. "The Scotties, Brier and Worlds have three draws a day. The longest day is when there is late-night practice. After all the games, each team is allowed 10 minutes. It's usually the coach and the alternate on each sheet you're playing. If you're playing two games the next day, you get those two sheets of ice. Late-night practice lasts an hour, so you may be there til 11:30 at night. Normally you get the next morning off. You officiate three games and then get one off."

And there's not much time for socializing with the rest of the officiating crew. They may be all together for the volunteer breakfast, but that's it. There are debriefings after each draw and each day, but you will never see an umpire unwinding in The Patch.

Tom says his worst memory as a Game Umpire was during a 2015 Grand Slam event when Brad Gushue fell face-first onto the ice during a game and had to be taken to hospital. That was bad, but worse for Tom was when Brad reappeared and said he wanted to go back into the game. "Before I could open my mouth to say, "no", the Technical Director (who had precedence since this wasn't a Curling Canada event) said, "Sure, go ahead." At that time there was no concussion protocol, but based on my own competitive experience, I never would have allowed it," says Tom.

"There were only two ends left and Newfoundland was in control. Brad was wobbly, he didn't make his shots, and they lost! Brad was sick for months afterwards with a concussion. Within a year, Curling Canada had a concussion protocol in place."

Tom has been a game umpire at national and world competitions in Canada and was chief umpire at the Ontario Winter Games in Pembroke, his first role with CurlON.

"I've never been a Chief Umpire or Deputy Chief Umpire at a national event, so that may be a future role," he says.

"Curling Canada is always looking for good timers. It's not for everybody – you can't be everyone's friend. It's a different part of the game, and there is a time commitment. Some people are naturally inclined to be referees or umpires. And we do need a crew of young people coming through."
